I purchased a property from a fraudulent seller. I was unaware of the fraud and was a Bonafide buyer. Rightful owner is claiming the property. What is my legal position? How could I recover my money?

- 5. Innocent Purchaser's Rights: In "SULTAN v. PACKEER et al," it was recognized that an innocent purchaser who has done no legal or moral wrong and who was obliged to defend themselves against a charge of fraud successfully should not be penalized unjustly.
